# **SPEAKERS**



#### Jessica CHIBA

She is an Assistant Professor at the Shakespeare Institute, University of Birmingham. Her research focuses on the intersection between Shakespeare and philosophy, especially where questions about language overlap with issues surrounding knowledge and existence. She is currently working on a project entitled, *Shakespeare's Untranslatabity*, which considers Shakespeare's works through aspects that cannot be translated.



#### **Daniel GALLIMORE**

He is a Professor at Kwansei Gakuin University. He is one of the leading scholars on Japanese translations of Shakespeare and in particular on Tsubouchi Shoyo's translations. He has published papers in journals that include *Critical Survey* and *Cahiers Elisabéthains* among many others. He is currently completing *The Japanese Shakespeare: Language and Context in the Translations of Tsubouchi Shoyo* (Routledge, forthcoming).



#### Yoshikaze KAWAKAMI

He is an MA student of Global Japanese Literary and Cultural Studies, Graduate School of Letters, Arts, and Sciences, Waseda University.



#### **Adrian PINNINGTON**

He is Professor of Japanese Literature and Intellectual History at the School of International Liberal Studies, Waseda University. He has published widely on English literature, Japanese literature, and Japanese intellectual history.



#### **Kirstopher REEVES**

He is an Associate Professor who teaches primarily for the Global Studies in Japanese Culture Program at Waseda University. His speciality is Heian period (ninth century) Sinitic court poetry.



## **Gaye ROWLEY**

She is Professor of English and Japanese Literature and Director of the Library at Waseda University. Publications include *In the Shelter of the Pine: A Memoir of Yanagisawa Yoshiyasu and Tokugawa Japan* (Columbia, 2021), *An Imperial Concubine's Tale: Scandal, Shipwreck, and Salvation in Seventeenth Century Japan* (Columbia, 2013), *Autobiography of a Geisha* (Columbia, 2003), and *Yosano Akiko and* The Tale of the Genji (Michigan, 2000).



#### **Robert STAGG**

He is a Leverhulme Research Fellow at the Shakespeare Institute, University of Birmingham, and an Associate Senior Member of St. Anne's College, Oxford. His first book, *Shakespeare's Blank Verse:* An Alternative History was published by Oxford University Press last year. He has also published articles in Shakespeare Survey, The Review of English Studies, Shakespeare, Essays in Criticism, Studies in Philology, and numerous edited collections.



#### Rieko SUZUKI

She is Professor of English at Waseda University. Her research interest is nineteenth-century English literature with a particular focus on poetry. Her publications include *Negotiating History: From Romanticism to Victorianism* (Waseda, 2012) and *The Shelleys and the Brownings: Textual Re-Imaginings and the Question of Influence* (Liverpool, 2022).
